My main goal was to establish and maintain a bold pace and to make every jump match. Ramsey was very light and loose in this round, which really helped with my nerves and in pulling off the plan. We ended up winning the third round as well to secure the overall championship. Everyone rode incredibly well both days and the environment and atmosphere was really fantastic. I had a lot of fun competing in this special class and made many unforgettable memories. I am so incredibly grateful for my amazing trainers at Dawson Grove Farm that l've been lucky enough to learn from and am so thankful for all of the effort they put in to help prepare me for this final.
